MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Dear Friends,

In my annual message rarely would I focus on what takes place at the close of the year, but as we all know, this past year ended like no other. The Covid-19 pandemic came in like a lion, and well, simply never left.

The impact on the global education system has been all encompassing, shutting down schools and colleges, sending home millions of students and teachers alike. CODE, like so many others, raced to keep up, shifting support to home schooling kits and distance learning opportunities.

In the many lessons learned to date, two stand out for me – those already disadvantaged by poverty and marginalization are being left even further behind as education inequalities increase and accelerate. Second, that access to quality education is key to every nation's ability to recover and build resilience to future crises. What it tells me is that CODE programming, our belief in quality education for all, is more important and more needed than ever.

But the year was certainly not one of crisis alone. We moved full steam ahead in executing the vision we laid out in our 2019-2022 Strategic Plan, launching programs such as the *Transforming Girls Education Program* aimed at improving reading and learning outcomes for vulnerable girls in upper-primary grades in Sierra Leone. In Liberia, we wrapped up the fifth and final year of the *Reading Liberia 20/20* program. In Mozambique new textbooks guiding teacher practice were published and put into use in teacher training institutes nation-wide while at the

same time an exciting program for student teachers was initiated to build their skills in the teaching of reading and writing through one-on-one mentoring of young learners. In Ghana, alone, we distributed 10,080 locally published books to children in need of quality and relevant reading materials.

We want to work with the best and the brightest in the international education space. *Our Context Matters* initiative for example supports a research agenda by and for Africans in language and literacy. Each year, up to five research grants of CAN \$10,000 are awarded to increase the effectiveness, efficiency and salience of K-12 education programming including teacher preparation and teacher.

Over the past year we have, together, reached 142,640 children through our literacy programs and have provided 3,913 teachers with professional development to help ensure their effectiveness in the classroom. We cannot accomplish all that we do without your generous support. On behalf of the staff, the board, our in-country partners, the children and the teachers we support, we appreciate the trust you put in us to help us make the world a better place helping us to strive to ensure every child can read and write.

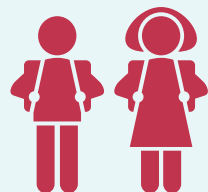

LITERACY PROGRAMS

CODE works to ensure that every child, no matter where they live, can learn from well-trained teachers who have the confidence and know-how – and the access to quality, relevant reading and learning materials they need – to deliver the learning outcomes all children deserve.

We effect change by working in partnership with locally based organizations who ensure the sustainability of programs and who provide a local voice and local expertise. We facilitate community participation, including stakeholders such as Ministries of Education, parent teacher associations and academic partners.

CODE collaborates with partners to develop locally appropriate solutions and then works with governments and institutional funders to scale-up change to a national level.

Together with our partners, we have helped more than 10 million children gain access to better quality of education and benefit from reading and writing in order to improve their lives and the lives of their families.

CODE improves learning outcomes and educational opportunities for all girls and boys by working with like-minded organizations in three areas – Literacy Programs, Research Initiatives and Literary Awards.

LITERACY PROGRAMS

SIERRA LEONE

This past year, CODE was pleased to formally establish a country office in Freetown to keep pace with new programming opportunities. CODE's Sierra Leone country office staff continue to work in close collaboration with our long-standing partner organizations The Association of Language and Literacy Educators (TALLE) and PEN-Sierra Leone.

On behalf of the Ministry of Basic and Senior Secondary Education in Sierra Leone, and funded by the World Bank's *REACH for Reading Research Fund*, CODE completed a research program to test the efficacy and efficiency of using variations of a Communities of Practice approach to teacher development.

In June, CODE launched the *Transforming Girls Education Program* aimed at improving reading and learning outcomes for vulnerable girls in upper-primary grades. This program is funded jointly with the Government of Canada through Global Affairs and includes an innovative new pilot initiative to fund 100 scholarships for aspiring female teachers.

This past year has also proven to be a productive one in book development. Several writers and illustrator workshops were held to develop eight new books for children focusing on gender responsive themes. These books will be published and distributed next year. Additionally, three new anthologies for students were published and distributed as part of the *REACH* program.

In February, we were delighted to have sailors from the Royal Canadian Navy aboard the *HMCS Glace Bay* and *HMCS Shawinigan* visit CODE project sites to share their love of reading with students.

LITERACY PROGRAMS

LIBERIA

With the generous support of many CODE donors and foundations - including the Turing Foundation, 60 million girls Foundation and International Book Bank - we successfully concluded the fifth and final year of the *Reading Liberia 20/20* program.

We held intensive workshops with 110 educators this past year and were pleased that 77% met the standard required to receive the Ministry of Education's C-Level teaching certificate, which our local partner organization the WE-CARE Foundation is accredited to grant.

We also saw very encouraging results in student learning. An aggregate review of reading assessments completed between 2016 and 2019 found that after nine months in the *Reading Liberia 20/20* program students performed substantially better than those in comparison schools. Our Girls' Accelerated Learning Initiative (GALI) continued to benefit 375 over-age girls at 25 schools. The program was designed to assist over-age girls in grades 1 through 3 to support academic success and accelerate them towards a more age-appropriate grade level, thereby reducing their vulnerability to dropping out. The program results were very positive with 75% of girls being promoted two grade-levels and 22% being advanced one grade.

We were delighted to obtain renewed pledges from the three aforementioned *Reading Liberia 20/20* funders whose support will allow us to launch a new phase of work in Liberia in the next fiscal year.

LITERACY PROGRAMS

GHANA

Over the past year, CODE has worked closely with the Ghana Book Trust and our funding partner Asanko Gold to implement the fourth of our six-year *Reading Ghana* program.

Our collective efforts were focused on supporting students in eight new schools in the Esaase area of the Ashanti Region. We held a series of 5-day intensive training workshops with 64 educators and librarians focused on building competencies and capacity in new methodologies of literacy instruction and promotion.

Additionally, a total of 10,080 books were distributed to past and present *Reading Ghana* schools. The mobile library van visits organized in partnership with the Ghana Library Authority created much excitement at our program schools.

An analysis of student reading assessments conducted during the past three years of the *Reading Ghana* program showed positive impact on two key measures of literacy: oral reading accuracy and reading comprehension. Most notably, in oral reading accuracy, *Reading Ghana* primary students on average read 62% of the words correctly in paragraph reading compared to 49% at comparison schools. Amongst our junior high school participants, reading comprehension was more than two times greater than amongst students at comparison schools. LITERACY PROGRAMS

MOZAMBIQUE

CODE's *Better Education Through Teacher Training and Empowerment for Results* (BETTER) program – jointly funded by Global Affairs Canada – is working toward long-term systemic change within Mozambique's education system.

In collaboration with our partner organization Associação Progresso and the Ministry of Education and Human Development (MINEDH), we are working to develop and strengthen teacher training curriculum at teacher training institutes in Cabo Delgado, Tete, Niassa and Maputo provinces.

This past year saw the culmination of significant effort on the part of many national and international subject matter experts as we published three new textbooks to complement the two published last year. These textbooks – the first of their kind in Mozambique – are now in use at 19 teacher training institutes and available as digital interactive formats on a dynamic new mobile learning platform.

Ongoing support is being provided to teacher trainers to familiarize them with the new textbooks, and to help them gain confidence in the use of the participatory and gender-sensitive strategies that they promote.

Building on the findings of our 2019 study of gender-equality in teacher training institutes, we gained political support to lead the development of a national policy to address gender-based violence in teacher education, in a joint effort with a multi-departmental working group from the MINEDH.

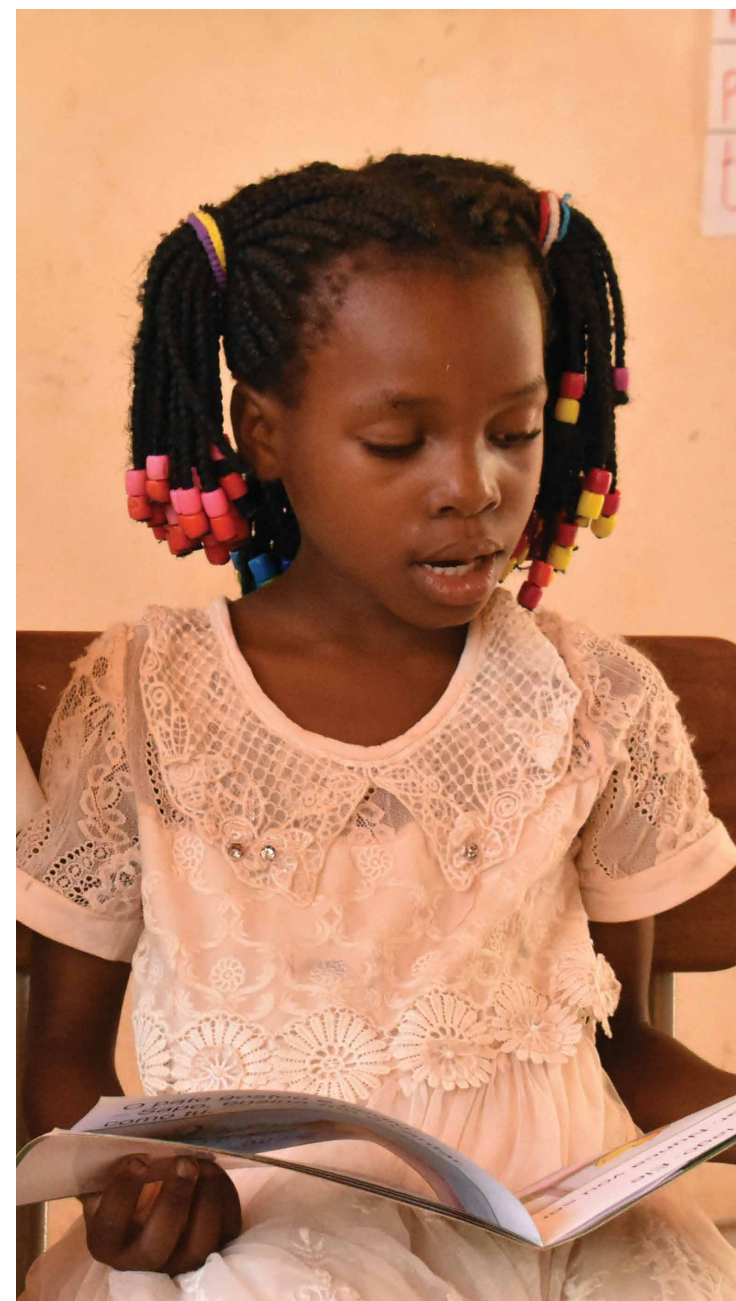

LITERACY AWARDS

THE CODE BURT AWARDS

The CODE Burt Award is a literary award and readership initiative that recognizes excellence in young adult literature for readers ages 12-18. The objective of the prize is to champion literacy, build language skills, and foster the love and habit of reading by ensuring that young people have access to high-quality, culturally relevant, and engaging reading materials. The Burt Award has been granted annually in Canada, Africa, and the Caribbean.

With the passing of the Award’s main benefactor – William “Bill” Burt – we regret that 2020 will mark the end of this important initiative. The final round of awards for the African and Caribbean program were announced in last year’s Annual Report, while the formal announcement of the winners of our Canadian award, including in a new Indigenous Language category, will be made in the coming year. Unfortunately, the announcement was delayed due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Since 2008, we have celebrated the achievements of exceptional authors by awarding 142 individual titles and distributing 311,000 copies of winning titles to an estimated 2,600 schools, libraries, and community organizations annually.

We are deeply grateful to William Burt and the Literary Prizes Foundation (now Consecon Foundation), as well as to the many authors, publishers and allied organizations who have shared our vision for this program over the past 12 years.

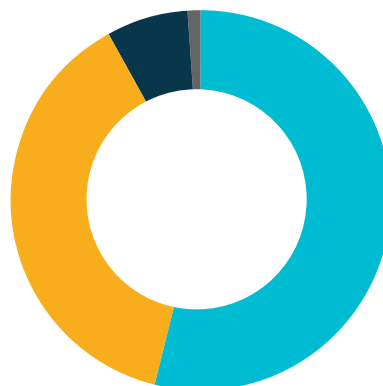

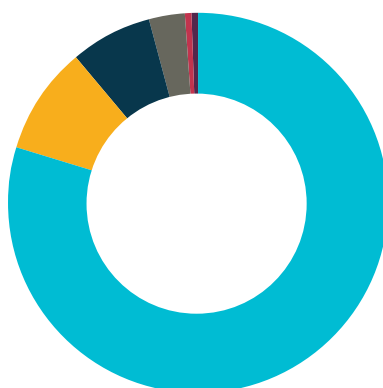
The value of in-kind contributions including both books and volunteer hours by CODE international literacy experts amounts to \$112,103 for the 2019-20 fiscal year.
